

FROM SCHOOL FOOTY TO THE STATE TEAM

Sophie Thomas was still in primary school when she was first introduced to footy.

Fast forward to 2022, and the year 10 Sacred Heart College student was part of the under 15 state team which competed at the Australian Football Championships in July this year.

Due to COVID, the players had to make their own travel arrangements to Albury in NSW and pay for their own accommodation.

Luckily, Sophie was awarded Youth Achievement Sponsorship, which the City of Holdfast Bay offers in recognition of young people in the community.

The \$125 grant covered her accommodation costs, allowing Sophie to focus on the game.

"I was rapt – I couldn't believe it and it was such a great honour to be part of the team," said Sophie.

"We came second just losing to Queensland in the end."

Sophie's mum Jo first heard about the sponsorship program via word-of-mouth.

"We are incredibly grateful to the City of Holdfast Bay for their sponsorship in helping Sophie to attend the national championships," Jo said.

"It was such a wonderful opportunity for her to compete against the best football players in the country and make lifelong friends along the way."

Sophie hopes that being selected in the final 25 – from more than 100 players who tried out – will open up even more opportunities. And her ultimate goal is the AFLW.

"I was lucky enough to be part of the Crows Academy squad in January and this gave me a taste of what an amazing club it is and to be a part of, if I had the opportunity," Sophie said.

"And there are now more opportunities and pathways for players like myself and younger players as well."

WEEKLY FOGO ALREADY REAPING REWARDS



The switch to weekly green-lid FOGO bin collections has been embraced by more than 14,000 households since the new service kicked off in July.

Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday zones are already achieving more than a 69% landfill diversion rate, with food scraps that would have previously gone to landfill now being recycled into compost.

Households can apply for an upsized landfill or recycling bin.

ENJOY BRIGHTON AS THE WORLD WATCHES ON

Stage 2 Santos Tour Down Under Thursday 19 January 2023

For the first time, Brighton will host a stage start of the Santos Tour Down Under in 2023.

The elite cycling event, which draws participants and visitors from all around the world, is back after a two-year hiatus due to COVID, with

Brighton chosen to host stage 2 of the race on Thursday 19 January.

The riders will gather at 11am on Jetty Road, before heading south along the Esplanade. They'll make a left-hand turn at Wheatland Street and will turn right onto Brighton Road, bound for Victor Harbor.

"We are thrilled Brighton is hosting its first Santos Tour Down Under stage start," said Santos Tour Down Under race director Stuart O'Grady.

"At 155.9km this is the longest of the Santos Tour Down Under's five road

stages. It's set to be pivotal."

The Santos Tour Down Under is taking place in Adelaide and regional South Australia from 13-22 January 2023.

THERE'S MORE THAN JUST CYCLING

The 2023 Brighton Jetty Sculptures exhibition will be held at Brighton from 18-29 January 2023.

The artworks will line the Esplanade with more sculptures on display in a marquee at Bindarra Reserve and inside the Brighton Surf Life Saving Club.

The first exhibition was held in 2008 with just 34 sculptures. The 2022 event saw a record 250 entries.

GLENELG TO HOST WOMEN'S STAGE START




Glenelg will feature as a stage start for the women in the 2023 Santos
Tour Down Under – the first ever UCI Women's WorldTour stage race in the southern hemisphere.

The cyclists will converge on Colley Terrace on

Sunday 15 January 2023 for Stage 1 at 11am.

They will travel along Jetty Road before turning right onto Brighton Road. From there, the riders will tackle the 110km route, which finishes in Aldinga.

Among the trees featured have been significant River Red Gums, a Norfolk Island pine, a Honey Locut tree at Alwyndor, a Hill's weeping fig and a small grove of New Zealand Christmas trees in Glenela.

MAKING COOL ROOFS COOL

Did you know that you could reduce your energy bills, help keep your neighbourhood cool and reduce air pollution and greenhouse gas emissions, just by changing the colour of your roof?

Council offers a small Green Living subsidy of up to \$100 towards the installation of a cool roof or to change the colour of an existing roof from dark to light.

Cool roofs are generally lighter in colour, which helps to reflect more heat and absorb less solar energy.

During Adelaide's hot summers, cool, heat-reflective roofs are estimated to reflect up to 70% more of the summer heat than a dark roof, which only reflects about 20-30% of heat. The rest of the heat is absorbed into the living spaces of the building.

A heat-reflective roof can be up to 28°C cooler during a heat wave, which leads to a cooler house overall, less energy being used to cool the house and therefore a reduced energy bill.

Not to mention a reduction in air pollution and greenhouse gas emissions.

A cool roof can be installed on any building or retrofitted.

There are also specialist paints for cool roofs that have the technology to maximise heat reflection and can be applied after installation.

ADOPT-A-TREE APPLICATIONS

EXTRA TREES AND NATIVE PLANTS HELP MAKE **HOLDFAST BAY GREENER**

If you notice our nature reserves and gullies are looking greener, you would be right. This year, more than 4,300 native plants have been added to the nature reserves more than half of which were planted by the Holdfast Habitat Heroes volunteers.

Winter was also busy for tree planting across Holdfast Bay, with more than 400 trees now in the ground. Seacliff received more than a third of the planned plantings with support from two grants received from Green Adelaide.

Most of the trees planted are Lagerstroemia, which are more commonly known as crepe myrtles. However there are 32 differing species of trees, which will ensure diversity and resilience for the next generation of trees across Holdfast Bay.

The roundabout on King George Avenue is now home to an Angophora costata, which is commonly known as Sydney red gum, pictured on right.

Here are some tips and reminders about council by-laws that are in place so everyone can enjoy the wonderful places we have to walk our dogs across Holdfast Bay.

DOGS NEED TO BE ON A LEASH

- On the beach during daylight saving hours from 10am-8pm.
- On all footpaths at all times.
- In signposted Hooded Plover areas at all times.

Legislation requires a leash to not exceed 2m in length.

EFFECTIVE CONTROL

 You should have effective control of your dog by voice command when the dog is unleashed, so that they return when called.

HARASSMENT

 A dog must not harass another person, animal or bird.



A TOUCH OF MAGIC FOR MEMORY SUPPORT

Described as a 'magic table' the Tovertafel offers light and colour-based sensory activities for people with cognitive challenges – and now, one resides permanently at Alwyndor, which is our aged care service provider based at Hove.

The Tovertafel projector was installed in August and is being used by the Memory Support residents and Day Respite clients. It is coordinated by Alwyndor's lifestyle and occupational therapy teams and supported by our therapy assistants.

The Tovertafel games are designed to develop and maintain skills of those people using it, in an engaging way.

It can be used by anyone, but it is particularly beneficial for people living with cognitive challenges including dementia and Alzheimer's disease.

Alwyndor launched a fundraising campaign to purchase the device – and a generous donation of \$8,000 by one of Alwyndor's visitors, helped achieve the fundraising target of \$20,000.

The Memory Support
Group is suitable for
people with a diagnosis of
mild to moderate dementia
and activities include
Tovertafel games, shared
morning teas and seated
exercises.

The class is held every Tuesday at Alwyndor from 10am – 12 noon.





EXERCISE IN FRESH AIR AND A BEAUTIFUL GARDEN SETTING

Wellness classes are now being offered on the newlyinstalled outdoor gym. The five-station gym can be used for balance, strength and cardio exercises and will be incorporated into the wellness classes timetable.

The gym is surrounded by lots of colourful garden beds, with

a large sail providing shade and weather protection.

An initial physiotherapy assessment is required before joining a group wellness class.

- Monday 1.15pm
- Wednesday 9.15am
- Thursday 9.15am

PICK UP AFTER YOUR PET POOCH

While you're out walking your four-legged friends, did you know that under our by-laws, it's a requirement to have a suitable receptacle to pick up after your dog?

But if you forget your bags, we provide free dog poo bags from 39 dispensers located right across the city – 19 of which are along the coast path.

The bags are also compostable which means they can go into your greenlid FOGO bins at home.

MEET THE HOLDFAST HERO PRESERVING OUR HISTORY

Over the past two decades, Jim Blake has spent about 10,000 hours at the Holdfast Bay History Centre – ensuring the community has access to the area's history.

His volunteer work in preserving Holdfast Bay's history culminated in the 2010 publication of Sea Change – a pictorial history of the City of Holdfast Bay.

Jim spent hours researching, photographing, and writing the book which tells the story of the changing face of Holdfast Bay since European settlement in 1836

A second edition of the book will be published by the end of the year with many more pages and photos added.

"I always thought we'd reprint in 25 years or so but there's been a significant number of changes in just the past 10 years," Jim said. The book includes photos from the late 1800s and drawings by John Skipper. He was an artist who arrived on the Africaine, the first passenger vessel to anchor in Holdfast Bay in 1836.

"I've been heartened by the number of people who have become interested in



the history of Holdfast Bay as a result of the book – that's the thing that I've got most out of volunteering," 83-year-old Jim

Jim, who grew up near Glenelg North, began researching his own family history not long after the History Centre opened in 2000.

"In the early days we spent a lot of time trying to preserve the collection and now we're more about trying to make it accessible," said Jim, who has called Brighton home for almost 30 years.

In 2010, Jim led a group of volunteers who dismantled and reassembled a historic beach bathing box.

Bathing boxes were once a common sight at Glenelg, Brighton and Seacliff but many were destroyed in the 1953 storm.

Bathing Box #20, which is now on the ground floor of the Bay Discovery Centre, had sat in a Burnside backyard and was used as a cubby house.

"It was an interesting project and whenever I go down (to the Bay Discovery Centre), I often see people who are really fascinated by it or had no idea that (bathing boxes) existed on our beaches," Jim said.




UPCOMING EXHIBITIONS
