## **GLENELG'S NEW AND IMPROVED CCTV NETWORK**

The CCTV network which covers Glenelg – from the Esplanade and Foreshore to the retail precinct of Jetty Road, has been improved and expanded in a recent network upgrade.

Almost half the existing cameras were replaced with new hardware and another 38 cameras added to the network, taking the number to almost 80 cameras in total

New cameras were added to five locations along Jetty

Road, as well as in Bouchee Walk and Chapel Plaza.

The remaining cameras will be installed along the Glenelg Foreshore from the Broadway Kiosk and including Brian Nadilo Reserve, Chappell Drive and to the Glenelg breakwater.

The new locations were selected in consultation with SA Police and Surf Life Saving representatives. Funding was received by the Federal Government's Local Roads and Community Infrastructure Program.

## Carbon neutral goal set for 2030

A target has been set by Council to become a carbon neutral organisation by 2030. Among the six key actions includes zero emissions vehicles like electric cars.

Council has already changed 75% of street lights to energy efficient LEDs with purchasing 100% renewable energy also on the agenda.

## **NEW TIPS FOR RECYCLING PLASTIC LIDS**

Recycling plastic bottle lids is easier than ever – just leave them on empty plastic containers including milk bottles and laundry detergent bottles and put them into your yellow-lid recycling bin.

The new instruction for recycling lids is a direct request from the operators of our recycling facility who have asked that plastic bottles are not filled with small lids as has been done previously.

This change is to assist the sorting machines which use ultraviolet, infrared and visible light detection to separate the plastic bottles, including soft drink bottles to plastic milk containers.

This is followed by an air jet which blasts the object into its designated sorting bin.

If the bottles are full of lids, they are too heavy to be properly separated.



If plastic lids are larger than 5cm, such as the lid on peanut butter containers, they can go into your recycling bin loose.

Metal lids, including beer bottle tops, can be placed loose into the recycling bin, they are picked up by magnets at the recycling plant.

Please be aware that these instructions are for City of Holdfast Bay, City of Marion and City of Onkaparinga residents whose household recyclables are processed at the Southern Material Recycling Facility.

## Get the most out of your household bins

Weekly FOGO is here. That means our default waste collection service sees green-lid FOGO (Food Organics Garden Organics) bins collected weekly, unless a household has opted-out.

Red-lid landfill bins are collected fortnightly as are yellow-lid recycling bins.


Bins can be collected anytime between 7am – 7pm on your area's designated day.

If your bin is missed, please phone our waste contractor Solo on 8295 5077.

To get notified of your bin collection day, download the free My Holdfast mobile phone

It will send a weekly reminder to your phone and lets you know which bins to put out each week.

Apple users can download it via the App store. Android users can download it via the Google Play Store. Enter "My Holdfast" into the search bar, then simply download and use.

## **OPEN SPACES**

It is a unique addition to banks of the Patawalonga at Glenelg North and the recently constructed herb spiral garden bed has already become a talking point for the community.

And for good reason. Its creators, Tom Crowley and Dave Ryan of our Open Spaces team, believe this to be the only herb spiral built in a public place in South Australia.



"They're quite rare in the world but it's all about making the most of a small amount of space by having different levels, and by making the most of water and the way it flows," said Tom (pictured above right) who was inspired to build the spiral herb garden after undertaking a permaculture course.

"The herb spiral is a really good example of permaculture techniques."

At the top of the spiral are herbs that require little water, including rosemary and thyme.

At the base of the spiral are herbs like chives, chamomile and mint, which like more moisture.





Using wood from a dead street tree that had to be removed, along with other recycled timber and rope, the pair constructed the spiral on site in a couple of hours – after several test runs off-site.

The project has already proven to be beneficial in multiple ways – not only in demonstrating how to transform a small, bare patch of land into something useful.

"We had a really good reaction at the time of building and whenever we do maintenance around here, people always come up to us and ask us about it," said Dave.

"One lady made a comment that she often walks her dog around here by herself, and one day she stopped to look at the spiral when someone else came over and started talking about it.

"Because of what we had told her about it, she passed it onto the next person.

"It sparked a conversation that she otherwise may not have had ... so that was really great."

The herb spiral can be found on the eastern side of the Patawalonga on Adelphi Terrace, near Newhaven Avenue.

## **HOLDFAST HEROES**



Sisters Ella and Mary are not only both Holdfast Bay locals, they're also active in the community as volunteers.

Mary, pictured above right, began volunteering more than five years ago and is now a regular face at the Brighton Civic Centre as the JP concierge. But her volunteering journey started at Alwyndor, as a support person for residents living with dementia.

"I was asked to go and work at Alwyndor because my background was in nursing in dementia care. I would visit the residents and have a conversation with them for an hour or so and it was quite beneficial for them," said Mary who hopes to return to Alwyndor as COVID restrictions ease.

Ella also volunteered at Alwyndor in administration support when she joined Holdfast Bay's team of volunteers in 2018.

"Volunteering makes me feel productive and that I'm able to assist people that have a need," she said.

Both Mary and Ella encouraged others to give volunteering a go.

"We're treated nicely and you're helping other people, so why not give it a go," Mary said.

Ella added: "It's a great way to feel engaged with the community".

What do more than 300 people who live in our community have in common?

They're all dedicated volunteers who together, spend more than 3,700 hours each month serving the Holdfast Bay community – be it on the Community Bus, as personal transport drivers, as Holdfast Habitat Heroes or sharing their knowledge at the Bay Discovery Centre.

## SENIORS SHARE THEIR WISDOM WITH HIGH SCHOOL SENIORS


**COMMUNITY WELLBEING** 

In a first for Holdfast Bay, more than 30 'senior' members of the community have shared their life experiences, wisdom and tips for success with high school 'seniors', via a video titled Seniors for Seniors.

The intergenerational community project was inspired by the ABC program Old People's Home for Teenagers and features 35 Holdfast Bay seniors from all walks of life, including residents from Alwyndor.

"It's so good to be able to contribute anything that will help a young person in life," said Valerie Boas, aged 80, who volunteered to be part of the video

Her tips for life centred around nurturing personal relationships.



Retired doctor Jenny Cameron, aged 65, encouraged high school graduates to "build a tribe of people that you can call on".

"People in year 12 have the whole of their lives ahead of them and even though things are topsy turvy (with the current climate and COVID), the world is still a beautiful place," she said.

The Seniors for Seniors video was shared with last year's year 12 graduates at both Brighton Secondary School and Sacred Heart College and on Council's website and social media channels.



## Simple innovation puts run-off water to good use

If you see a council water truck filling up on Wilton Avenue at Somerton Park, it's actually doing two iobs at once.

Not only will the 9000 litres of water it takes on be used to water the city's street trees, but any run-off water is also diverted towards a row of jacaranda trees... thanks to the installation of two TreeNet inlets in the kerb

So instead of water pooling in the gutter and going to waste, those trees get a drink too!

Council has two water trucks that hit the streets of Holdfast Bay five days a week from October to March each year.

Between them, they water around 2400 street trees which are newly planted or up to four years

Each tree gets a big drink about every eight days, but residents can help look after their nearest street trees by giving them extra water particularly on hot days.

#### What are TreeNet Inlets?

TreeNet Inlets are small, unobtrusive stainless steel grates which are installed into the side of the kerb to collect rainwater.

The grate is connected to an underground water collection pit. Council has installed more than 250 TreeNet Inlets across the city.

#### What are the benefits of installing TreeNet Inlets?

TreeNet Inlets are strategically placed in low lying areas to reduce long-term stormwater ponding.

Instead of water ponding on the kerb or in the road, it gets diverted

## into the ground to water our trees and replenish the aquifer. Keeping our street trees healthy By diverting rainwater into the ground, the street trees will have access to a

passive source of irrigation. Over time, the tree roots will find this favourable source of water and become more resilient and healthy.



## Providing additional environmental

Healthier street trees not only make for a cooler urban environment, they also have flow-on effects including providing more oxygen, protecting us from harmful ultra violet rays, increasing property values and improving our wellbeing.

By diverting rainwater to the trees, it also reduces the amount of stormwater that would otherwise flow out to sea.



#### What can you do to help the TreeNet Inlets?

In summer, you can help our street trees by regularly filling the TreeNet Inlet collection pit with a bucket of water.

In winter, an occasional light sweep across the grate will unclog the exterior of the inlet of any leaves or debris which may build up over time. Council's maintenance team will also undertake regular street sweeping to keep the gutters clear.

Beachgoers should swim between the red and yellow flags and follow advice of lifequards or volunteer lifesavers.

Swimmers should never swim alone, or under the influence of alcohol or druas.

Stay calm if you get in trouble in the water and signal for help by holding up one arm and waving, float and wait for assistance.

#### Top 5 water safety tips when at the beach

1. Swim at a patrolled beach.

- 2. Stay between the red and yellow flags.
- 3. Always watch children on the beach and in or near the water.
- 4. Avoid dangerous activities such as jetty jumping or venturing near the breakwater
- 5. Be sun smart slip, slop, slap, seek, slide.
