We'll soon be sharing with the community all the feedback we


received and the steps we'll be taking next so watch this space.



Two decorative fence screens, which feature designs by Indigenous artist Allan Sumner, are part of completed rejuvenation works at the former Buffalo site at the Patawalonga.

The old mooring site was compacted, filled-in and paved over and a new rockwall was built. The new fencing also extends to the Wigley Reserve playspace.

Titled Munaintyarlu, the designs on the Corten steel panels capture the essence of the Kaurna people's connection to the Patawalonga River, reflecting the deep roots of creation, beginnings and the ongoing cycle of life in the region.

The new, large open space that has been created as a result of the rejuvenation works acts as a continuous footpath with improved connectivity to the playspace, kiosk, car park and pedestrian loop around the Patawalonga.



Recycle old x-rays

Disposing of tricky items like old x-rays is now easier with a dedicated bin at the Brighton Civic Centre.

We also have recycling bins for soft plastics, small e-waste items, batteries and printer cartridges. The Tricky Waste page on our website lists more than 30 waste items and how to recycle or dispose of them correctly.

SMALL BUGS HAVE A BIG JOB TO DO



The native beetles are natural predators to the pest insects, which if left

untreated, can kill the affected trees slowly, by draining them of sap.

The pests are mostly targeting ficus and fraxinus trees but it's hoped the ladybird beetles will reduce the need for chemical treatments

Since our first Tree of the Month in April 2021 – a red flowering gum on Sixth Avenue, Glenelg East we've adorned another 48 trees with a Tree of the Month sash or medallion.

long-running social media campaign.

Nominated by members of the community, the trees are much loved and valued for their shade, beauty, uniqueness and sometimes, just how good they are to climb on or swing off.

Among the trees honoured over the years include the rare ombu at Partridge House and a bracelet honey myrtle, which is growing almost horizontally on the banks of the Patawalonga.

There are around 22,625 trees in Holdfast Bay – of which 19,368 are street trees – with hundreds more added each year as part of Council's winter tree planting program.

HOLDFAST HERO

Each February, you'll find Sarah Tinney OAM floating around Brighton Jetty dressed as Marilyn Monroe - along with several hundred more Marilyns.

The reason why she dresses up, wig and all, is simple. The now worldrecord breaking event, called the Marilyn Jetty Swim, is a fundraiser for Cancer Council SA and has raised more than \$1.8 million since the first swim in 2012.

Sarah, pictured right, started the jetty swim with just 50 Marilyns in response to her mum's cancer diagnosis. The fundraiser has grown each year and in February this year, 765 Marilyns took to the water at Brighton with hundreds of people cheering and waving them on.


"What started as a light-hearted conversation with some of the ladies at our local surf club about doing a fundraiser with a difference, has become something I'm incredibly proud of," Sarah said.

"Each year we have a fabulous time knowing that we're making a big difference."

As part of the Australia Day Honours list. Sarah was awarded a Medal of the Order of Australia for her fundraising efforts.
