### MAYOR'S MESSAGE

July is an exciting month for us at Council as we now have our goals and plans in place that we'll see come to fruition over the coming year and beyond.

On the ground, our Open Space team is working hard to ensure that more than 600 new street trees get a great start to life, which will add to the beautification of our city.

Other teams across Council are working on continuing to provide great services and facilities for our community and that includes looking after our people, our environment, our business and tourism operators.

With our Annual Business Plan and budget in place for 2023–24, this year will see the completion of several projects, including the new Kingston Park Kiosk. Due for completion before the end of the year, this is going to be a wonderful asset that the whole community – locals and visitors, including those staying at the Brighton Beachfront Holiday Park – will enjoy for years to come.

At Glenelg, the Disability Discrimination Act (DDA) compliant beach access ramp is under construction and I'm so pleased to see this important infrastructure project come to life.

Our promise was to make our beaches accessible all year round to all members of the community – once again, both locals and visitors. In 2023, this will finally happen.

Accessibility and inclusion for all in our community continues to be a focus for our council and rightly so.

Funds have been allocated for the construction of more

DDA-compliant footpaths and bus stop ramps across the city.

And we'll see improvements being made to the ground floor of the Glenelg Library with accessible meeting rooms, learning and maker spaces.

### HUNDREDS MORE STREET TREES FOR THE CITY

The winter months and street tree planting go hand in hand.

And with more than 600 trees to get into the ground – from Glenelg North to Kingston Park – it's a busy time of year for Council's Open Space team.

The team is planting more than 440 trees in 20 locations across Holdfast Bay.

Contractors are supporting the team to get the rest of the trees into the ground before the weather warms up.

A total of 17 different species will add to the variety of trees across Holdfast Bay, with new plantings including drooping sheoaks, water gums, red gums and crepe myrtles.

The differing species will ensure diversity and resilience for the next generation of trees across Holdfast Bay.

An additional 100 trees will be planted as part of the Adopt-a-Tree program, which is now taking applications for 2024.

Council is working towards a goal of increasing the tree canopy across the city to 16.8% by 2030.

### FOUNDATION LAID FOR NEW KINGSTON PARK KIOSK

Construction of the new Kingston Park Kiosk is well underway and is on track to open by the end of the year.

The new kiosk will be constructed along the edge of the coastal path within the Brighton Beachfront Holiday Park and includes indoor dining for 40 patrons, 42 seats in a shaded outdoor area, a take-away servery and ambulant and disabled toilets.

Car parking next to the holiday park is temporarily reduced, however the accessible parking space on the southern side of the car park is still available.

Council allocated \$1.4 million towards the project which includes integrating the kiosk into the caravan park and landscaping.



### RATES

Council has budgeted to raise \$42.02 million in revenue from general rates (excluding the Landscape Levy but including separate rates). This includes a rate increase of 6.9 per cent, which equates to an increase of \$2.20 per week for the average residential household.

We have also budgeted for additional income of \$9.90 million from a range of non-rate revenue sources, including but not limited to revenue from our commercial operations, grants and subsidies.

### **ASSISTANCE WITH YOUR RATES**

Your rates are based on the value of your property, as assessed and set annually by the State Valuation Office.

You can pay your rates in full as a single payment or in quarterly instalments. Support may be available if you have difficulty in paying your rates.

If you are a residential ratepayer, you can apply to have your increase capped at 10 per cent. This option aims to limit the impact of large increases in property values and is subject to the criteria set out in the application form.

### FUNDING OUR PLANS FOR 2023-24

We have budgeted for:

- A consolidated operating surplus of \$895,062 (Alwyndor surplus of \$509,117 and municipal operations surplus of \$385,945)<sup>1</sup>
- A consolidated operating income of \$94.2 million to cover our operating expenditure of \$93.3 million
- A 6.9 per cent rate increase (excluding separate rates and the Landscape Levy<sup>2</sup>)

In 2023–24, we will invest \$56.69 million to provide services, implement programs and build or maintain essential assets, including:

- > \$40.42 million to provide services to our community
- > \$8.08 million to upgrade and maintain community assets
- \$8.19 million for new capital infrastructure and service improvements

#### FINANCIAL MANAGEMENT

Guided by our Long-Term Financial Plan, our financial management takes a long-term view that ensures we maintain a sustainable financial and asset management position. The 2023–24 Annual Business Plan forecasts a project borrowing requirement of \$4.74 million to fund the proposed program of works.

Council works with the following financial targets:

- 1. To achieve an operating ratio of 0-10 per cent
- 2. To achieve a net financial liabilities ratio of less than 75 per cent
- To improve Council's asset sustainability ratio to be within the range of 90 – 110 per cent over a five year period

### WHAT'S IN A NAME...



### WHO WAS MICHAEL HERBERT?

Hundreds of cars drive across the Michael Herbert Bridge over the Patawalonga each day, on their way to and from Glenelg.

But how many people know the story of the man it was named after? Michael Patrick John Herbert.

A plaque, which is attached to a boulder on the eastern side of the Pat, shares his wartime story. It began in 1970 but remained unfinished for 39 years.

Michael attended Sacred Heart College – where there is another plaque in his memory – and was only in his 20s when he achieved his civil private pilot's licence.

In 1964, he joined the RAAF, and was posted to No 2 Squadron as a Canberra bomber pilot.

In February 1970, he arrived in Vietnam – eight years after Australia joined the allied forces, led by the United States, to fight in the Vietnam War.

Barely nine months later, Flying Officer Michael Herbert and his navigator, Pilot Officer Robert Carver, disappeared from radio contact during a night bombing mission. They were declared missing and presumed killed.

It was not until 2009 when the wreckage of their aircraft was finally

discovered – almost 39 years later. After his repatriation, a full military funeral was held.

In 2011, the new bridge that was built over the Patawalonga was named in his honour.

Not far from his family home in Glenelg North, the Michael Herbert Memorial Garden was established about eight years ago, in connection to the William Kibby VC Veterans Shed.

There is also a display in memory of Michael inside the Glenelg Air-Raid Shelter at Glenelg East.



### SHINING A LIGHT ON THE ROLL OF HONOUR

At the Australian War Memorial in Canberra, Michael Patrick John Herbert is among more than 103,000 names on the Roll of Honour list.

Those names are shone onto the exterior of the Hall of Memory as part of a nightly commemorative event. Michael's name can be seen on:

### **MAJOR PROJECTS**

### PROTECTION OF PINE GULLY NEARING COMPLETION

The transformation of Pine Gully – which has seen the installation of major stormwater infrastructure and a walking trail – is almost complete.

The revitalisation project to future-proof Pine Gully at Kingston Park started in 2021, with extensive removal of introduced tree species and weeds and soil stabilisation of the slopes.

More recently, 20 metres of pipe, 10 metres of culvert and three large pits were installed to control and redirect water from the top of Pine Gully to the base, especially after heavy rainfall.



Rock armour was installed along the base of the gully as another way to assist with erosion control.

A walking trail and steps will link to the laneway at Pine Avenue.

The gully will be replanted with native vegetation in coming months.

Council consulted with the Kaurna Nation and received advice prior to the stormwater works commencing in November 2022.



### **GLENELG BEACH ACCESS RAMP OPENING SOON**

Construction of a new access ramp next to the Glenelg Jetty is almost complete and will soon be open to the public, providing year-round wheelchair access to the beach.

The ramp, which is 15 metres long in a switchback design, and 2.3 metres wide, is Disability Discrimination Act (DDA) compliant.

It's been constructed out of UV resistant material which can also withstand the coastal conditions and has a lifespan of 100 years. Construction started in May this year, with \$120,000 allocated to the project, including a \$50,000 donation from the State Government.

Another six access points onto Glenelg Beach were upgraded earlier this year, between the jetty and Broadway Kiosk.

The new stairways have greater ability to cope with fluctuating sand levels and reduce maintenance requirements for Council.

There is also a ramp, located near Pier and Robert streets, which has a non-slip surface.

### **HOLDFAST HEROES**

For the past 25 years, Elise Knight has kept herself busy, volunteering at both the Brighton Library and the Holdfast Bay History Centre.

And it is this commitment which saw her honoured with a service award at this year's National Volunteer Week celebrations.

"I started volunteering at the library, delivering books, and I was also part of the Friends of Brighton Library group," said Elise.

"That group started meeting in here, at the History Centre, and I thought it looked interesting, so I started volunteering here as well." Elise says she's learnt an extraordinary amount of Holdfast Bay's history, after migrating to Adelaide from the UK in 1966, and she has a particular interest in family trees and helping people do their own.

"I love it – the social history behind it all and why people do what they did and how it helped Holdfast Bay to develop," she said.

Elise's advice for people considering volunteering is to follow your interests.

"Especially in the council, they are always looking for volunteers to fill the gaps... and you're giving back to society."
