### **SUMMER SAFETY**



Volunteer and professional lifeguards are back on our beaches doing their best to keep swimmers safe.

Surf Life Saving SA is also encouraging all beachgoers to take their own simple precautions to keep themselves, friends and family out of harm's way.

Volunteer surf lifesavers patrol the beaches on weekends and public holidays at Glenelg, Somerton, Brighton and Seacliff, including Seacliff Surf Life Saving Club president Jacinta Day (pictured).

On weekdays during the summer months, paid lifeguards patrol Glenelg Beach.

### Here are lifesavers' top beach safety tips:

- Always swim at beaches with patrolling lifesavers or lifeguards
- Stay between the red and yellow flags
- Never swim alone
- Don't swim under the influence of alcohol or drugs
- Learn how to spot a rip and keep clear of it
- If you get into trouble in the water, stay calm. Signal for help by holding up one arm and waving, float and wait for assistance
- Be sun smart: slip, slop, slap, seek, slide
- Keep out of dunes and fenced areas
- Avoid dangerous activities such as jetty jumping or venturing near the breakwater rocks

### Accessible beach days back for the summer

Glenelg Beach will host a series of accessible beach days in the coming months, taking to six the total number of accessible beach events held this summer.

Council is working with ParaQuad SA (PQSA) to host the beach days, two of which were held in December last year and this January.

The next four accessible beach days will be held on Saturday 20 January, Saturday 3 February, Sunday 18 February and Sunday 10 March 2024.

Council will supply 50-metres of beach matting from the Glenelg Foreshore, north of the jetty, to the water, providing access for wheelchair users and people with mobility difficulties.

There will also be beach wheelchairs available to use and the Mobi-chair floating wheelchair, with PQSA volunteers on hand to provide assistance and support.

### Iconic tram returns to the Bay

A teenage LEGO enthusiast has brought Tram 361 back to Glenelg – in model form. And his creation now has a permanent home at Glenelg's Bay Discovery Centre.

Jackson Hefford has been passionate about trams and everything transport since he was three years old – and a Holdfast Bay Community Grant allowed him to bring his vision to life.

The model took nine months of planning and design, two days to complete the build and used about 1,700 LEGO bricks, some of which were sourced from overseas.

Jackson says he's thrilled to see his creation on permanent display at the Bay Discovery Centre. The tram display is on the first floor of the museum.

### ADELAIDE FESTIVAL COMES TO GLENELG

28 February - 2 March 2024

Get ready to be swept off your feet as Glenelg Beach transforms into a stage of wonder and enchantment for the world premiere of the captivating dance production, Baleen Moondjan.

This contemporary dance production is from creative visionary Stephen Page, an icon of Australian Indigenous dance formerly of Bangarra Dance Theatre.

Set among giant whale bones on the sandy shores of Glenelg, Baleen Moondjan tells the story of a proud Elder, a curious granddaughter and the day a baleen whale comes close to shore.



### Explore Glenelg's underground wartime history

Located beneath part of the Glenelg Oval is a slice of Glenelg's wartime history, which dates back to the 1940s.

Built during World War II, the Glenelg Air-Raid Shelter was one of seven constructed in Adelaide's most populous suburbs and formed part of a communication network.

Converted into a museum in the 1990s, it is now staffed by volunteers with cabinets displaying photos, diaries and personal effects including helmets and a gas mask.

There are also tributes to fallen heroes such as Australian nurse Millie Dorsch

and William Kibby VC, whose memories both live on at the William Kibby VC Veterans Shed at Glenela North.

You can visit the Air-Raid Shelter on the following dates, between 1pm – 3pm:

- Sunday 21 April 2024

On Anzac Day, 25 April 2024, the Air-Raid Shelter will be open from 11 am – 1 pm.

Entry to the shelter is via a steep flight of stairs. It is located at Rugless Terrace, Glenelg East.

### Historic Glenelg Mansions



By the mid-1880s, the sand dunes of Glenelg's Esplanade had given way to the summer residences of wealthy South Australians. Take a 1-hour stroll past some of the mansions that still stand today in Glenelg.











The multi-faceted, multi-year upgrade of Glenelg Oval - which has resulted in upgraded tennis courts and clubrooms, new unisex change rooms, cricket practice pitches, tiered seating, a playspace and improved accessibility - is coming to an end.

After more than three years, the final pieces of the puzzle are coming together. This includes the much-anticipated improvements to Margaret Messenger Reserve in the north-eastern corner of the oval precinct.

Along with new accessible pathways, which link through to Glenelg Oval, still to come is a new fitness station, BBQ, shelter, seating, upgraded basketball court, mini soccer goals and irrigated turf to provide an open space for all to enjoy.

The real-life Margaret Messenger, after whom the reserve is named, was pleased to see the upgrades unfold.

"I was told about the plans for the reserve and I thought it was lovely," Mrs Messenger, an Olympic gold medalist, said previously.



"The reserve has been neglected in the last few years and it is nice to think that (council) is not forgetting about it and that gives me an enormous amount of pleasure."

Improved plaza entry from Rugless
Terrace into the north-east corner of
oval will soon be completed, along with
landscaping.

On Williams Avenue, at the back of Glenelg Oval, the service access laneway to the oval and Glenelg Primary School was recently improved including separated pedestrian and service vehicle access into these points.

The upgrade of Glenelg Oval began with significant improvements at the Holdfast Tennis Club.



In October 2021, new multi-purpose change rooms were installed, providing a much-needed boost to female participation in sport.

In March 2022, new football goal posts were installed at the oval and an electronic LED scoreboard replaced an old manual scoreboard. New behind goal ball stop/cricket sight screen structures also helped bring Glenelg Oval in line with other SANFL grounds across Adelaide.

An official opening of the upgraded Glenelg Oval is planned for later in the year.

### Tips for tricky waste

Some waste items are not suitable for any of the three kerbside waste bins - and need to be disposed of elsewhere, including batteries.

Batteries can cause fires in the rubbish trucks so should only be recycled at designated battery recycling locations which can be found at the Brighton Civic Centre, Woolworths, Coles, Drakes, Foodland, Bunnings and Aldi stores.

Soft plastics, including cling wrap and plastic bags or wrappers, can be recycled in designated bins located at the Brighton Civic Centre and Glenelg North Community Garden.

Accessing the Hard Waste collections is another great option for large items including e-waste and mattresses. Each household is allocated one free pick-up per financial year. To book a collection, call 8295 5077.

# What's next for ho

### Our FOGO champions have the answer

Did you know that this year marks 17 years since the yellow-lid recycling wheelie bins were first introduced in Holdfast Bay? Imagine how full our landfill bins would be without them!

And while removing items such as plastic bottles, tins, cardboard and paper has been a game-changer in reducing the amount of waste we send to landfill, more can be done.

If you ask our FOGO champions, some of whom are the faces you see on these pages, the next frontier is food recycling through our household green-lid FOGO bins.

Our champions are among approximately 75% of households who have embraced weekly FOGO bin collections since it came into effect city-wide in September 2022.

Over a 12-month period, residents helped reduce the amount of waste sent to landfill by 23%.

At the same time, an additional 2,295 tonnes of food scraps and garden clippings were processed from households' green-lid FOGO bins.

That's the same as approximately 327,857 watermelons or 76.5 million brussel sprouts! Instead of being buried in landfill, it was recycled into nutrient-rich compost and mulch products.

For Kaleo from Seacliff, the move to weekly FOGO has been a simple change to make.

"It really gets you into the habit of going to the green bin first, and leaving the red bin alone," he said, adding that he can go for weeks without putting anything in his red-lid landfill bin.















# usehold recycling?



Another resident, Peter, is a proud FOGO champion and says his son Jayden's passion for recycling has prompted the family to buy less items that can't be recycled and more that can.

"Jayden is only three years old, but he's started bringing home pictures of trees and soil because he is so passionate about rejuvenating our planet through recycling," Peter said.

Remembering what items can go into your household greenlid FOGO bins is easy – if it grows, it goes. This includes food, nail clippings, hair, and even pet fur.

Meat, bones, eggshells, and dairy are other food products that can be recycled through household FOGO bins along with shredded paper, egg cartons and pet waste in a compostable bag.

All Holdfast Bay households are entitled to one free roll of compostable kitchen caddy bags (per financial year) with extra rolls available to buy for \$3 each. Pick up a free roll from the Brighton Civic Centre or Glenelg Library.

All Woolworths, some Foodlands and Coles supermarkets offer compostable produce bags, which are also suitable for kitchen caddies. Once full, the bags can go straight into your green-lid FOGO bin.

### Five fun FOGO facts

- Holdfast Bay is the state leader in diverting waste from landfill, at a rate of 69%
- Holdfast Bay households on weekly FOGO bin collections divert 83% of their waste from landfill, which is one of the highest diversion rates in the country
- Households on weekly FOGO bin collections place almost two thirds of their food waste in their FOGO bin – this is four times higher than households on weekly landfill bin collections
- Our weekly FOGO and fortnightly landfill bin collection model has been recognised as best practice, and is referenced in the State Government's Better Practice: Sustainable Kerbside Service guide for councils
- Three other metropolitan Adelaide councils are now undertaking similar pilot programs of weekly FOGO bin collections.

### WHAT'S IN A NAME...

### **WHO WAS JOHN MILLER?**

Many of us have been to, walked by or driven past John Miller Reserve at Somerton Park, which boasts a playground, gym equipment and lots of green space.

Overlooking the reserve is a stately white house which was once the seaside home of John Miller – the man after whom the reserve is named. But who was John Miller?

His story started in 1840, when he was born at Hindmarsh – just four years after the colony of South Australia was established

His work life was varied. He was a farmer and president of the SA Farmers Association, a member of the House of Assembly and was one of the founders of a boys' college, Wayville.

known as Somerlea and is the house that still stands today.

John Miller's first wife Mary was a niece of William Rounsevell, a prominent Mayor of Glenela. She died in May 1912. In December 1912, John Miller married Bessie Edith Puxton, also of Glenela and who was 40 years his junior.

They had seven years together before his death in 1919 at his Somerton Park residence. His final resting place is the North Brighton cemetery.

Reserve - to Brighton Council. This was 100 years after John Miller's birth and was so significant, it was reported in The Advertiser newspaper at the time.

The report, published on Tuesday 27 February 1940 on page 18 said: "The Mayor of Brighton (Mr. F. J. #### VALUABLE GIFT TO BRIGHTON Land For Recreation Reserve At Somerton

Yesterday afternoon the Mayor of Brighton (Mr. F. J. Brown) officially received on behalf of the corporation, the title deeds of land comprising approximately 21 acres on the Esplanade at Somerion, as a gift to the municipality, from the widow of Mr. John Miller, the ground to be known as the John Miller, the ground to be known as the John Miller, the ground to be known as the John Miller Recreation Park.

Mr. Brown said the magnificent gift would be for ever treasured. The land comprised one of the most valuable sites in Somerton, with a frontage of 445 feet to the Esplanade, with a depth of 180 feet to Whyte and College roads.

Ex-Councillor R. H. Niehuus introduced Mrs. Miller, who handed the title deeds to Mr. Brown. In doing so she said she hoped that funds would be made available for the necessary improvements for the establishment of a recreation park.

Mr. Brown said that the recent transport service to Somerton had improved the value of the land in that vicinity. The new park was the terminus of the bus service and therewas not a more favorable site for a recreation park at any of the beaches along the coast. The commercial value of the land was £4.000. He assured Mrs. Miller that the land would be made the best possible use of for the benefit of ratepayers and visitors. On behalf of the members of the council he thanked Mrs. Miller for her most generous gift.

Subsequently the mayor and mayoress entertained those present at afternoon tea in the parlor of the mayoress, which had been decorated with bowls of Melbourne Star dahlias by Mrs. A. H. Sanders, wife of the town-clerk.
